Your child can make his/her First Eucharist in Grade two or older after he/she receives the Sacrament of Reconciliation and after studying the book, "We Share in the Eucharist."

WHAT DO I DO AS THE PARENT?

Attend the Parent Information Night at Saint Theresa's Roman Catholic Church.

Help your child prepare for First Eucharist by attending 2 Saturday classes on **February 08** and **February 15** with him/her and the Teaching Mass on Thursday evening, **February 20** at 6:30 pm.

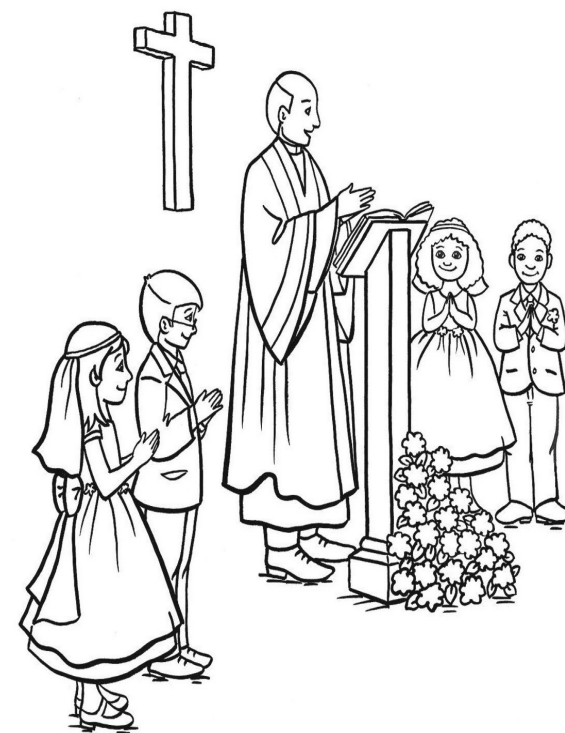

A MEAL TO REMEMBER:

A new life began for the friends of Jesus, the apostles. Jesus had died but has risen from the dead. His friends often talked together about all that Jesus said and did. They remembered his last meal with them and his beautiful words came back to them. At the end of the meal, Jesus said: "Do this in memory of Me." From then on, when the followers of Jesus shared the bread and wine, they remembered Jesus and he was there with them

Just as Jesus asked, his followers soon began to gather every Sunday, the day of the resurrection, in memory of Him.

WORDS OF THE CONSECRATION:

These are the same words Jesus said at the Last Supper when he broke the bread, gave it to his disciples: *"Take this, all of you, and eat it: This is my Body which is given for you."*

And then, he gave the cup to his disciples and said: *"Take this, all of you and drink from it. This is the cup of my Blood. It will be shed for you and for all so that sins may be forgiven. Do this in memory of Me."*

BREAD AND WINE BECOME BODY AND BLOOD OF JESUS:

This miracle takes place during the second half of the Mass – the Liturgy of the Eucharist. This is one major difference between the Catholic Mass and the Protestant Masses. God works this miracle through the priest when he says the words of consecration.

JESUS IS IN BOTH BODY AND BLOOD:

We receive the entire gift of Jesus from just the Body or just the Blood, but we are encouraged to have both. The Catholic Church teaches: *"Jesus is really and truly present when He gives us His Body and Blood."* (Catechism of the Catholic Church CCC #1375)

WE NEED THE HOLY EUCHARIST:

Eucharist means thanksgiving. Holy Eucharist is a sacred meal when we receive the Body and Blood of Jesus under the appearance of bread and wine.

Through Eucharist, we are nourished and strengthened in mind, body and spirit. Jesus said: *"I am the living bread which has come down from heaven. Anyone who eats this bread will live forever."*

PREPARING FOR HOLY COMMUNION:

When we invite special guests to our home, we clean and prepare our home for the visit. We must do the same when we prepare to receive Jesus at Holy Communion. We do this by:

1. Eating and drinking nothing (except water) one hour before communion
2. Being in a State of Grace.

A "STATE OF GRACE"

To be "in a state of grace" means to be free from grave or mortal sin. Sanctifying grace makes us holy and pleasing to God.

WHAT IF WE ARE NOT IN A STATE OF GRACE?

It is a very serious sin to receive Holy Communion if we are not in a state of grace.

SACRAMENT AND SACRIFICE:

The Holy Eucharist is not only a Sacrament; it is also a Sacrifice.

A Sacrifice is a prayerful offering made to God by a priest. The great Sacrifice of the Church is the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass.

The people in every Catholic parish, which is also called a Christian community, gather every Sunday or Saturday evening, just as Christians have done since the time of Jesus. Our parish church is the place where we will celebrate our First Communion during Mass.

When we celebrate Mass with our parish family, Jesus is truly there with us. When we go to Mass, also called the Celebration of the Lord's Supper or the Celebration of the Eucharist we look, we listen, we sing and we pray with the priest. We say the Mass prayers in a loud, clear voice.

At Mass, we share our faith in the real presence of Christ.
